COURSE DESCRIPTION

he 26th Annual San Diego Heart Failure Symposium, which will be held virtually, continues in the tradition of our past programs in providing registrants an update on the latest and most exciting advances in the management of heart failure through a series of didactic lectures. Topics that will be covered extend from preventing heart failure by managing risk factors such as hypertension, diabetes and hyperlipidemia to treating heart failure throughout all its stages. Key areas that will be covered include management of sleep disordered breathing, use of biomarkers, treatment of pulmonary artery hypertension, new uses of DOACs, and prevention of sudden death. We will provide an overview of the drugs used to treat heart failure and in the annual debate tackle the issue of how do we integrate all of these agents into the therapeutic regimen. The Symposium also covers use of percutaneous mechanical circulatory support, percutaneous treatment of valve lesions, use of remote monitoring, management of patients with advanced heart failure using LVADs and heart transplantation, as well as exciting new approaches for treating amyloid cardiomyopathy. New drugs for the treatment of heart failure will be discussed.

This year, the **6th Annual Stanley Lloyd MD Lecture** will be presented by **Dr. Mathew Maurer**, who is a Professor at the Columbia University. We have also included an embedded session devoted to cardiac and heart failure issues related to COVID-19 infection. This years 'virtual' meeting promises to be as exciting if not more so than previous meetings. And, it will provide an excellent way to keep up with all the changes that have been taking place in heart failure management.

SYMPOSIUM OBJECTIVES

At the conclusion of this program, the participant should be able to:

- 1. Summarize current and emerging treatments for heart failure, describe new guideline updates and provide practical information to help in the implementation of recommended therapies in individual patients.
- Review strategies for implementing medical and device therapies that will enhance prevention and lead to improved outcomes in heart failure patients.
- 3. Describe the impact of COVID-19 on the management of patients with heart failure.
- 4. Define how specific populations including minorities, women and the elderly respond to various approaches to treating hypertension and heart failure.

Heart failure (HF) is common, affecting nearly 5 million Americans. It is also one of the few cardiovascular disorders for which prevalence figures are increasing. An estimated 670,000 new cases of heart failure are diagnosed each year and this condition is a major cause of morbidity and mortality (80% of men and 70% of women less than 65 years of age who have HF will die within 8 years). Overall, HF is the number one cause of hospitalizations of the elderly in the U.S.

Knowledge about HF is accumulating rapidly. To help individual clinicians synthesize new information and integrate new approaches into effective strategies of care for patients with this syndrome. The Symposium will provide a comprehensive overview of diagnostic approaches, current evidence-based therapies and treatment strategies as well as emerging approaches for treatment.
